Conference Aims

The Hamburg conference is the first of a series of four transnational conferences. Each conference will build up on the previous one, creating a crescendo of learnings on integrated community care.

The first conference "Making the case for integrated community care" aims to:

- develop a common understanding of the meaning of integrated community care;
- demonstrate through evidence the positive impact that integrated community care can have on tackling inequalities, improving care experiences and care outcomes;
- illustrate how integrated community care has been adopted in practice through established case examples as well as newly developed 'promising practices', including facilitated site visits to local innovations; and
- explore the essential design elements in the provision of integrated community care that make the approach successful. This will include a focus on care delivery models and core organisational issues such as management, funding, governance, information sharing and accountability.
